

The Role of Islamic Education in Shaping Students' Moral and Spiritual Character in the Modern Era

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Abstract

The rapid development of globalization and technology presents major challenges to maintaining moral and spiritual integrity among students. Islamic education is defined as a process of developing students' physical, intellectual, and spiritual potentials in accordance with Islamic values (Wahjusaputri & Nastiti, 2022). Scholars such as Al-Attas and Ibn Miskawayh emphasize that education should instill *adab* a combination of ethics, discipline, and respectful behavior (Al-Attas, 1999). The primary objective is to cultivate individuals capable of achieving balanced well-being (*insan kamil*) (Al-Attas, 1999).

Moral development in Islam centers on *akhlaq al-karimah*, which includes honesty, justice, humility, responsibility, and compassion. These values are derived from prophetic teachings and modeled through the Prophet Muhammad's character. Moral education aims to shape behavior through internal motivation rather than external enforcement (Hasan, 2020).

Spiritual development in Islamic education is grounded in faith, worship, and spiritual consciousness (*taqwa*). Through religious practices such as prayer, remembrance (*dhikr*), and reflection students cultivate spiritual discipline that strengthens self-control, empathy, and purpose. The modern era presents challenges such as: a) exposure to unrestricted digital content, b) declining interest in religious values, c) consumerism and materialism, d) identity confusion among youth.

Therefore, educational institutions must adapt Islamic teachings to contemporary contexts to remain relevant and impactful.

Methods

This study employs a qualitative literature review approach (Alwasilah & Chaedar, 2011). Sources include journal articles, books, official reports, and previous studies on Islamic education, moral development, and spiritual formation (Sanasintani, 2009). The literature is analyzed using thematic analysis to identify recurring concepts related to Islamic educational values and their role in modern character building.

Ta'dib emphasizes correct behavior, respect, and self-discipline. In modern education, *ta'dib* helps students develop strong ethical judgment and self-regulation, essential for facing moral ambiguities present in digital and social environments (Ibnu Miskawayh, 1978).

Tawhidic Worldview and Spiritual Awareness

The *tawhidic worldview* establishes the unity of knowledge and life under the belief in one God. This perspective helps students understand that ethical actions are part of spiritual responsibility. It creates a holistic understanding linking religious practice with daily life, motivating students to act with integrity (Hasan, 2020).

Integrating Islamic Teachings into Modern Education

Integrative strategies include:

1. embedding Islamic values in curriculum design,
2. promoting character-based learning activities,
3. using digital literacy responsibly guided by religious ethics,
4. encouraging reflective and spiritual practices among students.

When implemented effectively, Islamic education enhances students' sense of responsibility, empathy, respect, and social awareness.
